DIVERTED - Animals who we were able to help keep out of the shelter by providing help and offering resources to the owner. This program is also known as our Pet Retention Program.

HUMANE EUTHANASIA - A shelter Veterinarian authorizes all euthanasia decisions for medical reasons. Euthanasia for behavior is authorized by shelter managers, supervisors and directors. All euthanasia decisions are made on a case-by-case basis.

TNR - ("Trap Neuter Return") and our "Working Whiskers" programs allow feral ("wild") cats to continue living their lives, outdoors. These cats are altered, vaccinated, ear-tipped, microchipped and released.

Note - The medical euthanasia of cats is higher during warmer months when increased breeding occurs. Newborn kittens who arrive cold, often with umbilical cords still attached and without their mothers, typically have poor prognoses and do not survive. In these cases, humane euthanasia may be appropriate. VCAS is proud, however to report that over 85% of all underage or underweight kittens do survive in our care.
